How many of us are bound by the chains of resentment? "No matter what, I will never let go of how you wronged me. I will take this anger, this hatred, to the grave!"

There is no freedom in such hatred. For resentment controls you. It permeates your being, your soul.

That's why Jesus has so much to say and declare about forgiveness. In the Gospel of Matthew 18:21-35, Peter asked Jesus, "how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister when I'm sinned against? Up to seven times?" Forgiving someone seven times is generous in the extreme, but Jesus went far beyond that.

Jesus told an outlandish parable about an "unmerciful servant" who received forgiveness for his own enormous debt, but then instead of extending forgiveness for a tiny debt that he was owed, he imprisoned his debtor. In the kingdom of God that Jesus announced, he instructed us to forgive not merely seven times, but seventy-seven times, or seventy times seven. The forgiveness that characterizes his kingdom is beyond calculation or comprehension.

Jesus also linked receiving forgiveness to offering forgiveness. He established a law of proportionality. We can expect divine forgiveness in the measure that we extend human forgiveness: "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from the heart." Similarly, in the Lord's Prayer we ask God to "forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors." Our own sense of the need of forgiveness is the basis upon which we freely forgive others. We can only long for ourselves what we lavish upon others.

Forgiveness of this magnitude finds its basis not only in our own sense of need but, even more sure and certain, in the character of God himself as a fundamentally forgiving God. Paul writes, "be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you" (Ephesians 4:32). And: "Accept one another, just as God has accepted you" (Romans 14:1, 15:7).

Remember these important thoughts:

It takes two to reconcile. It takes one to forgive.

You are not excusing the action.

You are not ignoring the wrong, the sin committed and the person responsible.

You are not eclipsing justice. What you are doing is setting yourself free from the weight of harm that you have carried far too long.

Over the years I've seen too many wonderful people, children of God, be dragged down into despair over what another has done to them. There was no chance for reconciliation and they just kept hold of the anger and harm, not knowing what to do with it, ever reliving the pain, allowing the perpetrator—long gone—to hold them in his or her power.

Forgive. Let it go. Release it! Throw it out! Take back the God-given power you have for your own life. For some, the time is right. For others, it will take time and healing. Perhaps you need to talk with someone, but take control.

Forgiveness is not weakness. It is not passive, not gutless.

Forgiveness and being forgiven is part of the fabric of being human.

Serious issues stare us in the face when we consider forgiveness.

Forgiveness is healthful. Forgiveness is freeing.

It may take time.

It may be one-sided.

But it will release you. It will set you free!

Join us at church during Lent as we continue to learn that we are a forgiven people made possible by God's grace shown on the cross as Jesus died for us so that we might have a right relationship with God. In the rational context, the basic and fundamental source in all this is that we were forgiven first! Might it be so difficult for us to return the gesture? Within the emotional realm we find it so hard to forgive, the pain and the hurt are always rendered fresh whenever we revisit what happened, but letting go is liberating, it may be painful but let us come to mind, that for us in the United Presbyterian church, forgiving while painful, is a healing and a needful hurt.

Mostly, however, the general population has grown up with no thought of a special day for renewal. 24/7 is now part of the American Culture but individually, let us think about how we can each incorporate Sabbath Rest into our lives and encourage friends and family.

Hurricane Response Update from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

On behalf of the Rev. Dr. Laurie Kraus, Director, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, I'm writing to share an update about PDA's response to the three hurricanes that battered parts of the Caribbean and Gulf Coast regions last fall—a response made possible by your generous donation of \$2500.00 Please see her message below. Thank you for supporting Presbyterian Mission! —Rev. Rhonda Kruse

Dear Partners in Mission at United Presbyterian Church Of Jamestown,

This past fall, three hurricanes battered parts of the Caribbean and Gulf Coast regions. Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria brought violent winds and severe flooding, and their rapid succession left many people and relief organizations overwhelmed. Your faithful and generous support, however, allowed the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to respond with the light of hope in the midst of chaos, through the work of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA). Thank you for your support.

Your gifts provided emergency funding in Texas, Florida, Cuba and Puerto Rico. In the days after each storm, PDA was on the ground, assessing damage, providing expert support, partnership, consultation and coordination. Impacted congregations received urgent assistance to continue in ministry to their affected neighbors. PDA's response is widening, providing resources for long-term recovery, working with partners to set up volunteer rebuilding opportunities, supporting capacity building and providing support and training for leaders in Compassion Fatigue and Resiliency. Fatigue and hopelessness often cause a second crisis long after the winds subside and the waters recede.

Historic support from Presbyterians ensured a swift response. In Florida, decades of work in partnership and capacity building with the Florida PDA Network (FLAPDAN) meant that preparation and coordination began before Irma made landfall. Collaboration with presbyteries in Texas provides coordination of disaster response efforts. Ongoing support from Presbyterians means that long-term redevelopment is accomplished as the love of Christ is made visible in all of the affected areas.

Nowhere is the need so pronounced as in Puerto Rico. Throughout the island, the loss of homes, infrastructure and loved ones has touched almost every resident. Many months later, thousands of people still lack electricity and running water. Your support is delivering the light of hope into the darkness of the disaster. From the aid and cleanup on the island, to support for presbyteries in Florida and New England as they receive many Puerto Ricans displaced by the devastation, to long-term rebuilding and development, your gifts have made the church's response possible. Because of your support, PDA is able to support a coordinator for relief and development efforts in Puerto Rico from the Puerto Rican Presbyterian community. This important step ensures that the work done by the church will be delivered efficiently and effectively and will build capacity should future disasters strike the U.S. territory.
