As I write to you it is a beautiful spring day. Another season that generally compels us to do certain tasks, maybe even routine activities associated with the season's change. As we progress through springtime, we may be sprucing up around the yard, the home, the office, and the garage. In doing that, we may want to also include our spiritual lives as well. Are there things that need to be thrown out, polished, or replaced?

Do we approach our spiritual lives with the same concern that we have for our physical wellbeing or our social wellbeing? Or do we have a room for our nagging questions about our relationship with God or our ability to remain faithful in our discipleship vis-a-vis the other pile of thoughts in our garage?

I would like to suggest an idea I received from Pastor Dennis Cates that might help with your spiritual spring cleaning. It reminds me of one of the exercises we did at Good News Club at Roosevelt School. *Take a sheet of paper and draw a line down the middle from top to bottom. Put the heading "God" on the right side and "Me" on the left. List those things that you are doing or thinking during this time. Place Christ-like or Godly thoughts or activities on the right and those things that relate to "self" on the left. Of course, some thoughts of self may be Christ-like or Godly. But, if your thoughts have nothing to do with serving the Lord, then you might want to put them in the "Me" column. This can be done on a daily or weekly basis. Upon completing your list, note whether your list is lopsidedly in favor of the "Me" side. If it is, consider some actions that might help to balance your lists, or hopefully, make it more lopsided in favor of God.*


You will find that much deep thinking and maybe agonizing may occur. At the end of your contemplation and prayer you will be in a better position to organize your spiritual nature. As you continue your spring cleaning, remember that God gives us life each day. That life does not belong to us, it belongs to God. When that fact finally sinks in, our need for spring cleaning will be minimal and we can spend more of our time giving God all the praise for the joy that fills our hearts.

UPW STUDY FOR MAY—IMITATING THE SAINTS LESSON 9–Hebrews 6:9-12; 13: 24-25; 12L 1-2;11:35-40

It seems before you can imitate anything or anybody, you have to identify who it is or what it is you are going to imitate. You see children imitating their pets; comedians imitating members of their family for laughs; dogs on Face book imitating people. Our lesson is *IMITATING THE SAINTS*. What saints? What are their names? Who are we looking at? How do we imitate them? One of the resources suggests we be careful who we are listening to. Is the person living out their witness with integrity? This could mean listening to people and do the words that come out of their mouths go in line with their actions or visa versa....do their actions reflect what they say? If they are part of the cloud of witnesses that we have been studying this past 8 months....who would you imitate in your own life? Martin Luther King? Ann Keller? Eleanor Roosevelt? Your next door neighbor? A single mother working as a bar maid. Who do we imitate in this imperfect world filled with imperfect people? We, as imperfect people have a tendency to judge everyone and so it becomes difficult to find people who live up to our personal standards. Just take a look at the imperfect people in the Bible and how God loves them, and puts them in positions to be witnesses. That is how God uses us too.

All of us wonder what we must do to clean house. Micah provides an answer in chapter 6 verse 8: "....and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God." And so, there you have it, a simple solution, yet so difficult to begin. My prayer is for fortitude and persistence and patience to wait on the Lord and to prepare your hearts to receive guidance from the Holy Spirit so that you may walk humbly with your God. Like spring, let us too get into that daily renewal, that daily purging, and that daily spiritual rejuvenation but most importantly, as we in awe watch the immensity of how our God creates and recreates nature and seasons, such humbling spring experiences must make us go deep in our daily introspection, and righteously walk in humility with our God, day in, day out, spring or otherwise.
