Sharing Christ's Love Through Service

United Presbyterian Church Sanctuary Restoration

Over the past few years our church leadership has been praying and working to develop a restoration plan for our Sanctuary and we are excited to announce our next step towards this church project. Today, we are kicking off the Sanctuary Restoration Capital Campaign to raise \$30,000. Our vision is to restore and renovate our Sanctuary in order to enhance and safely provide for our present church family and allow our worship space to serve generations to come.

As you may know, in 2018, dialogue began about plaster repair and painting that is needed in our Sanctuary. Further discussion presented balcony safety concerns and pew restoration questions. Meetings, investigation and conversations were held. Church Interiors, Inc., (www.churchinteriors.com) a leading church remodeling, restoration and renovation specialist, was chosen to handle our project with work to begin in June 2020.

The Sanctuary Restoration Project entails the following tasks:

- Raising the balcony railing to a safe height and install tempered glass panels below the railing to maintain the current appearance.
- On-Site pew refinishing (chemical cleaning, staining, and polyurethane finishing). Pew repair needs will be determined and dealt with as they are discovered.
- Painting and plaster repairing on the Sanctuary walls and ceiling. This includes repairing loose, crumbling, cracked plaster and loose caulking, spot priming and a minimum of two coats of paint. Stenciling of the ceiling will be similar to the current ceiling and colors will be in keeping with the historic nature of our Sanctuary.

The Sanctuary Restoration Project cost is estimated at \$115,381.00. A majority of the funding for this project has already been designated by the Session: \$41,000 from the Building Fund (already paid as a down payment), \$30,000 from the Melikian Fund and \$30,000 from the General Reserve Fund. The remaining \$14,381 is to be paid from donations.

The Faith of a Farmer

Ellen and I are in our fifth winter in North Dakota where there are, according to a sweatshirt worn by members of our church, four seasons – summer, almost winter, winter and still winter. I learned from last winter that I don't have to turn on the heater in the garage until maybe twenty-five below temperatures. I am hoping that we can save some money on utility bills this year.

If you don't count the Sunday a few years back, when Christmas was on a Sunday, we decided to cancel church the night before because of an impending storm that actually started in the afternoon of Christmas. It took us five winters of being your Pastor that we cancelled because of weather. That was on December 29, 2019 and just about everything was shut down.

For those who have been paying attention there is a spring flooding concern this year for a large area of North Dakota. The concern began this past fall and the amount of snow we've had raises the concern higher. This past fall we were able to be of assistance to members of our church who were in danger of having their house flooded by the James River. Some of us also helped to fill sandbags for the Jamestown community just in case.

The farmers have taken a big hit because of the weather and other factors. We have farmers in our church, who are dependent on the weather, that are hoping for a much better growing season than last year. I pray for the farmers every day. I pray for the Ag community.

Nowadays I am reminded often of my talks with John Schoeler. John is a deceased member of our congregation. In my conversations with John we talked about his relationship with God as one of trust. I believe he learned that as a farmer. Who knows what tomorrow's weather will bring the farmer? Will there be enough sun? Enough rain? Will there be too much of either? Will a cold snap or a powerful storm ruin the crops? Will the bees be numerous enough to do the pollinating?

As a farmer, you live in total dependence on God to provide. John had the sturdy faith of the farmer who knows how to work hard and to trust God for everything. He had the kind of relationship with God that was real and honest. It was part of the day-to-day of his life. He lived with God in the everyday.

And I think because he had been at God's mercy most of his life on the farm; because he had learned to trust God's faithfulness; because he had lived well; it wasn't hard for him, as he came to the end of this life, to reach out and grab God's hand and say "Let's go Lord. I'm ready. I can't wait to begin enjoying life again." I pray that we all have the faith of a farmer like John Schoeler. The faith that says, "I trust God for everything and in every circumstance."



Everyone knows construction/renovation projects always cost more than originally planned (unforeseen expenses, more repair work than expected, additional needs or wants, etc.) so extra funds are always good to have available. Nonetheless, even if there are not extra expenses, additional funds raised would reduce the amount of money contributed from the church accounts.

This Sanctuary Restoration Project is needed so we can continue to safely meet the spiritual needs of people who seek worship, peace and comfort in our church. We need your support to raise the Capital Campaign amount of \$30,000. Whether you give to the church on a regular basis, or just occasionally, we are asking you to consider contributing to this project prayerfully.
