December is the busiest month of the year for most people. Our days get filled easily with all kinds of activities and preparations for the coming celebration of Christmas. What can happen is that Christmas becomes a chore instead of a joy. So how do we avoid that? By taking time to slow down to remember what is really important. Not just in the religious sense, but for your own wellbeing and the wellbeing of your relationships. Remember the Advent and Christmas season is not a performance, it is a gift.

Christmas is a reminder that right here in the world there is a promise that God is with us. That in this very time with many difficulties, diseases, and death there is hope. That even with the struggle and upheaval there is peace.

The best part of this season is that it calls us to think about what we are thankful for, how we are blessed, and how might we offer love to others around us. We all have reason to be thankful and rejoice. The God we worship has blessed us with creation and his son Jesus Christ. In the world we find the opportunity to grow our faith, witness God's love, and cultivate the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

We enter the Advent and Christmas season with so much to thank God for. This congregation has continually served and persevered with God's ministry during the 7 years I have been working alongside with you in ministry. It was with great joy and gratitude for this past Pastor Appreciation Month with the outpouring of this congregation's generosity to me and my wife Ellen.

At this time, let us rejoice at the blessings of life, love and faith. May we witness God's love to the lost, lonely, and hungry. Take time to rest, think, meditate on the mystery of Christmas, turn off your phone, and bask in the saving, gracious knowledge of Jesus Christ. Let the joy of salvation fill our hearts, and the peace in our being with the love that we feel everyday be the most important item in our thanksgiving and the hope that springs eternal be relived not only during advent but every day as we bask in the presence of Christ in our lives, truly God Immanuel!

Blessings, Pastor Bob Christmas lights were up along the streets of Kristiansand, Norway soon after Halloween. A number of special items are produced for the Christmas season. There is Christmas beer (Julebrus), Christian soft drinks (Juleol) and Christmas cookies. I bought a box of cookies called Pepperkakehjerter. The name means "gingerbread hearts" since the cookies were in the shape of hearts. Mothers bake gingerbread, form the dough into various shapes (including gingerbread men) and their children decorate them with icing. They also make gingerbread houses and decorate them. I also saw a box labeled Juleromkuler with pictures of chocolate balls with chocolate sprinkles on them. The name means "Christmas baubles." These cookies did not taste like chocolate.

Recently I was wandering along a path close to where I live and stopped to look at some red berries on a small tree beside the path. While other plants had red berries, to my surprise the leaves were dark green with pointed edges. This was holly. I had only seen it before in Christmas decorations (Deck the halls with boughs of holly). Most likely this is European holly which grows in bushes and small trees throughout much of Europe and the southern border of Norway where I am living. I do not know if the tree had grown wild or was planted by someone. The tree is an evergreen and its "glossy green prickly leaves and bright red berries" continue through the Christmas season.

This plant had symbolic significance for Christians. The red berries could symbolize the blood of Jesus that was shed for us. The thorny leaves reminded one of the crown of thorns placed on the head of Jesus. The shape of a leaf was like a flame and could symbolize God's burning love for his people. The evergreen character of the leaves could show the continuation of life even during the cold winter months. The plant was even called Christ's thorn.

While I have not yet witnessed the celebration of Christmas here in Norway, it seems that people eat and drink with friends and family, have special meals with family and take time off from work. I was told that the University in Agder would be quiet between Christmas and New Year's. I intend to witness some of the celebration. Handel's Messiah will be presented in the DomKiren. It is snowing outside right now so there might be a white Christmas which is also welcomed here.

Have a merry Christmas in Jamestown with friends, family and loved ones.
